## RESPONSE TO THE FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Please accept the following as my official response to the 2001-2002 Grand Jury Report on Juvenile Detention Facilities in Santa Barbara County, which was released on March 19, 2002.

**FINDING 23:** The Grand Jury found that juveniles are transported to the Mental Health facility in restraints for treatment due to the lack of an adequate treatment facility on site.

**RESPONSE:** The respondent disagrees partially with the finding. The present practice is that ADMHS staff will assess, counsel, and treat detained minors at the Santa Maria Juvenile Hall (SMJH). The following data shows the number of minors who were transported from SMJH to the Alcohol, Drug and Mental Health Services (ADMHS) Clinics in either Santa Maria or Lompoc has decreased.

October 2001 – 10 minors  
November 2001 – 7 minors  
December 2001 – 6 minors  
January 2002 – 5 minors  
February 2002 – none  
March 2002 – 1 minor

**Recommendation 23:** Probation Department should provide a quiet, segregated room on site to conduct counseling sessions

**Response** The recommendation has been implemented. The Probation Department has made available, at the SMJH, one of the on-site modular buildings for ADMHS staff to conduct assessments, counseling and treatment. The modular is large enough for family counseling whenever the need arises. ADMHS can also visit with minors in one of the interview rooms in the office or in the main classroom whenever it is not in use. ADMHS staff also utilize a small office to do paperwork.
